## **DENTAL HYGIENE DEGREE PROGRAM**

**Target Audience:** This course is intended for students in the Dental Hygiene Degree Program. It is a core course for dental hygiene students in all admissions options. Students must be computer-literate and will access health-related indices as part of the course.

Course Format: Online, 1 term

#### Calendar Course Description:

An exploration of the principles that govern oral disease and their clinical and patho-biological aspects.

#### **Program Course Description:**

This course is designed to advance your working knowledge of the principles that govern oral diseases, and the clinical and patho-biological aspects of diseases that affect oral and maxillofacial tissues including the influences of systemic diseases.

Students will build on basic knowledge and expand their analysis of the clinical signs and symptoms of oral disease in view of known physiological, biochemical and histopathological alterations. Current research is expanding the emphasis on the biological aspects that underlie all facets of the diagnosis and management of oral disease.

As the nature of oral disease changes, oral health professionals must assume increasing accountability for the health of the public. As the population ages within an environment of increasingly complex medical interventions, oral health professionals must have an enhanced working knowledge of diseases of the oral tissues and oral manifestations of systemic disorders. This course emphasizes the clinical features, the biological mechanisms and the tissue changes underlying the clinical manifestations of these diseases and conditions.

**Prerequisites:** Successful completion of previous year.

#### Course Goals:

- To provide opportunities for review and analysis of a wide range of oral diseases and conditions.
- To expand the analytical and clinical skills of students relative to clinical signs and symptoms of oral diseases and conditions.
- To foster development of an expanded working knowledge of diseases of the oral tissues and the oral manifestations of systemic disorders.

#### Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course students will have an increased ability to:

- Interpret clinical information to develop a working diagnosis for oral disease conditions.
- Recognize the need and the timing for referral in simulation settings.
- Develop a referral letter based on referral protocols.
- Compare protocols for the management of suspicious lesions.
- Explore best practice approaches to communicate and collaborate with dental and medical practitioners and specialists.
- Analyze approaches to participate in the management of oral diseases and conditions.
- Demonstrate professionalism by taking responsibility for learning, and making constructive contributions to the learning of others through course activities and projects.

#### **Course Content:**

Topics include but are not limited to:

- Oral infections
- Oral mucosal disease
- Advance oral oncology
- Oral medicine
- Odontogenic cysts and neoplasms
- Non-odontogenic diseases of the jaw
